History: Beach and Peach Urban Park is located in the Southside Estates area of southeast Jacksonville between Anders and Beach Boulevards. Ernest and Evelyn Anders began developing the Southside Estates neighborhood in 1945, and Beach Boulevard opened in December 1949. The city's Preservation Project Jacksonville, with the help of its partner The Trust For Public Land, acquired the property in 2002; and a grant received from the state's Florida Communities Trust (FCT) program was later applied to the purchase price. The name of the park, which contains a five-acre pond, derives from nearby Beach Boulevard and Peach Drive. After input from the community and preparation of a master plan, development of the park began in March 2007 and was completed in September 2007.

History: Brookview Elementary School Park is located in southeast Jacksonville, just east of the Brookview subdivision that was platted in 1953. After purchasing a 14.6-acre tract in 1957, the Board of Public Instruction constructed a school on the north portion of the property in 1962. Duval County soon leased the south portion for use as a playground, which contained play equipment and a baseball field. Eventually a basketball court and two baseball/softball fields were added, and the park became home to the Arlington East Athletic Association, which organized as a Florida nonprofit corporation in 1982. The Association plays its youth baseball, softball, and T-ball games at the park, and has built several of the amenities, including the restroom/concession building and the picnic pavilion. To insure access for both students and the general public, the City and the School Board have signed a Joint-Use Agreement for the park.

History: Forestry Tower Park is located in the Windy Hill section of southeast Jacksonville, at the intersection of Beach and Forest Boulevards. The name derives from a former fire lookout tower that rises 100 feet above the grounds. It was called the Flagler Fire Tower (Henry Flagler's FEC Railway line to the beach passed adjacent to the property) after being moved to the site by the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1938, and renamed the Southside Fire Tower in 1959. The property also contained a residence for the fire lookout (later mobile homes). But the Division of Forestry closed the operation in 1992, and through the efforts of the area's residents and neighborhood associations, and City Councilman Howard Dale, the site was designated a local landmark in 1996. The city purchased the tract for a park the next year, and today it presents a very picturesque setting, with high elevation and many pine, oak, and cedar trees.

History: The Huffman Boulevard Park is a new park site development for the City of Jacksonville. The 14.85-acre tract is located about a half mile north of Beach Boulevard, in the Arlington area. The site is characterized by sandy will drained soils, natural vegetation including live oak, turkey oak and pine. The under story is characterized by saw palmetto and natural grasses. The Huffman Road Park site was acquired by the City of Jacksonville on November 10, 1987 from City National Bank of Florida. The site was donated from a Trust (No. 5196-5) agreement dated August 2, 1973. DPRE submitted a 2002-2003 Florida Recreation Development Assistance Program (FRDAP) grant application for \$200,000 on October 12, 2001. The proposed project consisted of a playground area for children, a multi-purpose court, family picnic areas, restrooms, and a perimeter walking/jogging path, which would meander through a preserved wooded area. On October 22, 2001, DPRE withdrew the application because the City had exceeded the number of allowable projects for the 2002-2003 grant cycle. In August 2001, Ordinance 2001-631-E appropriated

\$17,500 from District 2 Better Jacksonville Bond Money to fund a Master Plan, boundary, topographical and tree surveys for Huffman Boulevard Park. Landers-Atkins Planners prepared the Master Plan in August 2002. The final Plan included the following elements: Paved and grass parking, landscaping, irrigation, a shared storm water retention pond, a 222' x 360' multi-use field (soccer, football, baseball) with bleacher stand, two full-size basketball courts, one 100' x 100' multi-use court with benches and trash receptacles, restrooms, play equipment, a bicycle rack, a picnic pavilion, grill, picnic tables, open play area, 800' dirt bike path, ½ mile paved pedestrian trail, sidewalk system, fencing and on-site security. DPRE plans to apply for FRDAP funding during the 2003-2004 grant cycle. If awarded, these funds will assist in the development of Huffman Boulevard Park. Highlights The future development of Huffman Boulevard Park will add to the inventory of quality parks in Jacksonville. This neighborhood park will allow residents to enjoy passive and active recreational opportunities within walking distance of their homes. The proposed development of this park consists of a playground area for children, a multi-purpose field and courts, family picnic areas, restrooms, a dirt bike path, and a perimeter walking/jogging path, which will meander through a preserved wooded area.
